Tsimshian Territory

The Tsimshian are an Indigenous people of the Pacific Northwest Coast. Their communities are mostly in coastal British Columbia and far southern Alaska, around Terrace and Prince Rupert in British Columbia, and Alaska's Annette Islands. The Tsimshian people consist of approximately 10,000 members of seven First Nations (including the Kitselas, Kitsumkalum, and the "Allied Tribes" of the Lax Kw'Alaams; the Metlakatla, Kitkatla, Gitga'at at Hartley Bay, and Kitasoo at Klemtu). The Tsimshian are one of the largest First Nations peoples in northwest British Columbia. Some Tsimshian migrated to Annette Island, Alaska, where their descendants in the Metlakatla Indian Community number about 1450.

Indian Residential School Survivors Society

IRSSS provides essential services to Residential School Survivors, their families, and those dealing with Intergenerational traumas. These impacts affect every family and every community across B.C. and Canada. This fact is most evident in the Corrections Canada Services-the numbers of First Nations people incarcerated, Child and Family Services child apprehensions, the high number of people on social assistance, unemployment and underemployed, lower levels of education, the lowest number within an ethnic minority of "determinants of health", the list of impacts is extremely high while the services available to effectively assist impacts of Residential Schools remain quite low.



Arlene Roberts - IRSSS

Arlene Roberts is from the Nisga'a / Tsimshian Nations and has 34 years of sobriety. Her son is Mike Dangeli, she has three stepchildren who call her mom (a title she dearly treasures), and is the grandmother of five wonderful grandchildren. Arlene also served for seven years as a firefighter in her community. She was raised in the culture of her nations and in accordance with the matrilineal tradition and responsibility to family, clan house, and community.

Kukpi7 Rosanne Casimir is a strong Secwépemc Woman leading by example. She is the 14th elected Kukpi7/Chief for Tk'emlúps te Secwépemc.

Kukpi7 Rosanne's personal mission statement is "Know your Passion, Visualize your Plan, Collect your Resources, and be Determined to Succeed!" She upholds these values in both her personal and professional life. She will continue to stand tall in her code of ethics which includes honesty, fairness, and trust.

During her tenure as Kúkpi7, the remains of 215 children were found buried on the site of the former Kamloops Indian Residential School.
